For the week of September 28th the students wrapped up their unit on “The Age of Exploration” with a unit test. The test grades should be posted in Aeries by Monday October 5th.

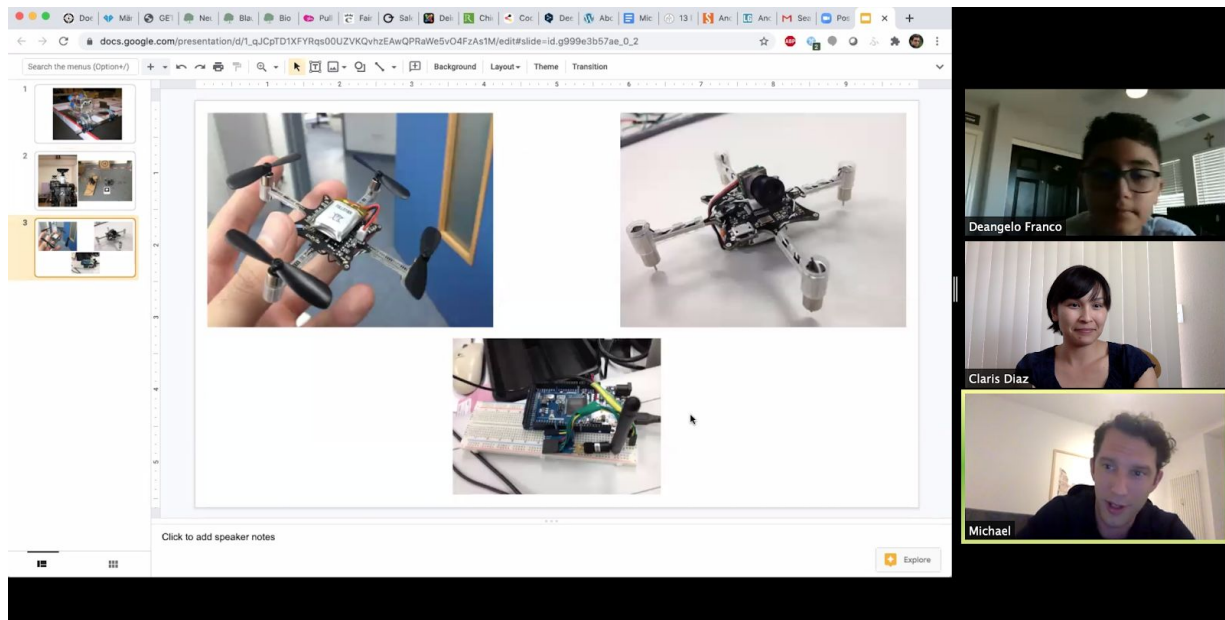
For the week of October 5th the students will begin their unit on “The Struggle for North America” which teaches about cooperation and conflicts amongst the different groups of peoples.

This week: Using their great sleuthing skills, the DCS forensics team were able to figure out what their mystery substances were. They compared the data of the analyzed known substances to the data of their mystery substance to look for similarities between them. With this technique, they successfully solved the mystery. On Friday, the forensics team were put under the lamp with their end of the month test. Varsity: We took our first quiz on division this week. We will focus on word problems and 2 digit divisors starting next week.

Scholastic: Students finished their 2nd quiz for the unit. We will begin practicing adding and subtracting decimals next week before moving on to much more applications of decimals.

Honors: Students took their 4th quiz on scientific notation and operations. We will spend all next week reviewing for our first test of the unit which will take place Friday.

NewsELA, IXL, and NoRedInk are online resources we used throughout the 2019-2020 school year. We will continue to use these resources, and

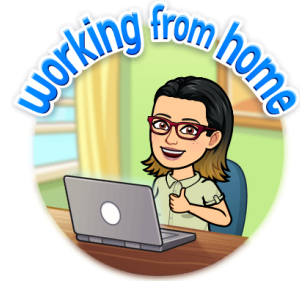
emphasize their importance in the gradebook. Every student is encouraged to practice using these online resources to build skills and knowledge.

Language Arts with Ms. Rodieck

September is done and we are moving on to October.

Scholastic and Honors have been reading about Francis Gary Powers and his role in the Cold War. We also learned a bit about the beginning of the Space Race, another important element in the Cold War. We learned about Direct Objects and started learning about how to diagram them. This will continue into next week. Students also learned about how to hook our readers with our writing. Next week we will do Introductory Paragraphs using a bridge to connect the hook to the thesis statement.



Varsity is continuing to work on Main Ideas and applied what we have been learning to our writing on Friday. Students will continue to learn about the Cold War with abridged reading passages. Next week, we will work on supporting details and using them in writing a summary. Students need to continue to do IXL for 15 minutes a day as Homework to help improve their skills in Language Arts.

All groups also learned about Spy Gear and created (or started) mini projects on the different gadgets created and used during the Cold War.

I may not be in class one day next week as I have to do my Civic Duty and may be called in for Jury Duty. Ms. Fergeson (of Social Studies) will cover my class and the students will learn about what is Jury Duty - one of the civic responsibilities people fought for during the Cold War.
